The Fog of Lent

During my three years of seminary in Sewanee, Tennessee, I was able to take in much of the beauty of that place on the edge of the Cumberland Plateau. I loved walking or riding my bicycle across campus on my way to class, gazing in wonderment at the majestic trees and colorful flowers, listening to the birds sing and other animals scurry through the brush. It gave me time to reflect on the wonders of nature and to appreciate the beauty of creation.

One thing I never got used to, however, was the thick fog that occasionally developed over the area from late fall to early spring. It was a cloud that descended upon the whole mountain, sometimes lasting for days at a time and reducing visibility to only a few feet. Driving was a challenge because the road and the curbs (not to mention pedestrians and other traffic) were virtually invisible in the thick soup. My walks on these foggy days were eerie experiences: I could not see the trees or the flowers, and I could not hear the birds or other animals. It was a feeling of isolation, of being cut off from the world and not knowing what was ahead of me.

The season of Lent can sometimes create this same type of fog within my soul, as I am reminded of my own blindness and shortcomings in my service to the Lord. In my self-examination, I am sometimes left feeling isolated, shamed by those sins that seem to have enveloped my whole being, and I am afraid of where the path might take me. But even in the midst of this haze I will catch a glimpse of some relief, like the headlights of a passing car piercing through the fog, and I realize that even in my isolation I am never truly alone. God is with me along this journey, guiding me through the fog of my sin so that in the end I may see the splendor and beauty promised by the resurrection.

As we all walk through the fog of another Lenten journey, let us always be mindful of the fact that the Lord is with us every step of the way. Let's not be afraid to walk into the cloud, to confront our own blindness and shortcomings. For that is the only way to true repentance, to lift the fog, and to witness the bright day that lies ahead.



Windows



One of the many special things about St George's is the windows, each unique in view.

We get the big window. When we have arrived, have settled into "our" pew, and have said our private prayers and petitions, we get the window.



When we look up over the altar what do we see? This window features the traditional "church" type shape and is complementary of the window in the chapel. It brings a little bit of the outside world into our services without dramatic intrusion. But maybe the drama really is there as we watch the passing scene of the wide variety of clouds - happy puffy shapes - low, angry, dark and tremulous menacing rumblers - the calm, empty sunshiny blue sky - a rainbow. All of these scenes form a backdrop for the symbolism of the beautiful Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.



Yes, we get the Cross, too.

The Cross. The symbol of our faith. The symbol of our Lord dying for us.

The round window to the congregation's left shares nature's seasonal changes seen on the tree limbs, not unlike Jesus's life. There is the budding of life in the fresh new green leaves, maturing into full embracing shade, bursting into the last vestiges of color and brilliance, into the "death" of the winter season, before once again displaying signs of new life.



Our other round window behind the organ pipes can possibly, if we want, be imagined into a mystery. What does this particular window "see"? Do the individual glass crystals "hear" the music of our voices? Does this window look onto the hiding places of our bats in our belfry?

Then there are the transom glass windows immediately over the doors to the Canterbury room highlighted by the beautiful etched cross honoring Cecelia the patron Saint of music and musicians. Unfortunately, few of us look up as we walk under, intent rather on exchanging greetings with Fr. Mark.



As we get ready to leave church or to first sign up for altar flowers on our way out, our eyes are drawn to the Canterbury window Out there --- the secular world and all of its issues awaiting us are found --- out there.

Our church windows are strong like our faith. Our lives reflect what these windows often show us - beauty, turmoil, variety, change, individuality, intrigue. We get clouds, sunshine, the occasional rain or snow. We get the Cross. We get the essence of Jesus Christ reflected in the majesty outside our windows.



Yes, sometimes our eyes and our minds wander.

Sometimes we are gazing at the ever-changing scene outside the glass.

Sometimes we are taking in the beauty of the day.

Sometimes the Cross "speaks" to us through the windows.

Order of St Luke Schedules Healing Services for 2024


Your local Metro St Louis OSL teamed worked with St. George's and St. Mark churches to offer seven healing services

in conjunction with SHINE and Holy Eucharist at St George's for 2024. Look for an opportunity to bring your own needs, or bring a friend for prayer and healing.

SHINE: Healing prayer and anointing will be offered at SHINE services on a quarterly basis. Prayer and anointing from clergy will be available, in addition to extended prayer with OSL two-person teams. The first opportunity is the SHINE service on Saturday, March 2 at 6 pm. Additional services are planned for June 1, September 1, and December 7.

Holy Eucharist: The litany of healing, prayer and anointing from Father Mark, as well as extended prayer with OSL teams is offered on March 10, July 14, and November 10 in conjunction with Sunday morning Holy Eucharist.

House calls: Your OSL team is blessed to come to homes, hospitals, and other venues to pray with anyone (parishioner or other). These prayer times can be particularly helpful in the times before surgery, or before a major treatment plan like chemotherapy or radiation therapy. 

I am one of them.




